# Bungalow Heaven Historic District

Bungalow Heaven Historic District is a residential neighborhood located in north central Pasadena. The sixteen-block area was developed primarily between 1888 and 1929 with one- and two-story residential buildings. The district includes 522 contributing and 164 non-contributing buildings. Although the district includes residences from most periods of Pasadena's history, the overwhelming majority of the houses (more than 70%) are bungalows that were influenced by the designs of the Arts and Crafts movement and were constructed between 1905 and 1920.


Bungalow Heaven Historic District was nominated to the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion C at the local level of significance under the registration requirements of the 1997 Multiple Property documentation, ["The Residential Architecture of Pasadena, California, 1895-1918: The Influence of the Arts and Crafts Movement"](#) and its associated historic context, "Single-Family Residential Architecture of the Arts and Crafts Period in Pasadena, 1895-1918." The historic district is significant as the largest intact grouping of working class housing constructed during the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries reflecting the influences of the Arts and Crafts movement in Pasadena. This economically modest neighborhood reflects the evolution of the bungalow form from its initial use through the lingering influences of Arts and Crafts design that were still popular throughout the 1920s, and influenced the revival period in American residential architecture.



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# Lakeport Carnegie Library



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In 1990, the [California Carnegie Libraries Multiple Property Submission](#) was approved by The Keeper of the National Register. It is used as a basis for evaluating related properties for listing in the National Register of Historic Places. The documentation included a survey of all Carnegie Libraries in California and assessed their potential for listing on the National Register of Historic Places. While ten California Carnegie Libraries were listed at the time of the Multiple Property submission, the document identified numerous additional California Carnegie library buildings as potentially eligible for listing, if they retained historic integrity. The Lakeport Carnegie Library was such identified.

Constructed in 1918 in the Classical Revival style of architecture, the Lakeport Carnegie Library maintains a high degree of integrity to its period of construction. The Lakeport Carnegie Library meets the registration requirements established in the Multiple Property Submission. Carnegie Libraries are significant in their respective communities under Criterion A in the area of Social History for their role in community development. The buildings are also significant under Criterion C in the area of Architecture because they reflect the popular styles of the time and exemplify a particular type of building.

# Ah Louis Store

Ah Louis Store is a two story, brick Victorian Italianate-style building situated in the center of the former Chinatown area of San Luis Obispo. The building was constructed in 1885. In January 2005 the building was earthquake retrofitted and brought up to code by mandate of the city of San Luis Obispo. The work performed met the [Secretary of Interior's Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties](#).

The property was nominated to the National Register of Historic Places at the local level of significance under Criteria A and B in the areas of Asian ethnic heritage and commerce. Ah Louis was an early Chinese-American pioneer who made significant contributions to the local Chinese and Asian communities in San Luis Obispo. His was the first Chinese store in the county and it became the hub of San Luis Obispo's Chinatown.

The property is California Historical Landmark No. 802 and is listed in the California Register of Historical Resources.

# Holmes-Shannon House

The Holmes-Shannon House is situated on a curving street on the north side of Victoria Park Drive in Los Angeles. The house was built in 1911 by Robert F. Train and Robert E. Williams, who designed the house for Michael Shannon and his wife Nellie Holmes Shannon. The house is a two-story, L-shape in plan Craftsman style house. The house features elaborate vergeboards, projecting false beams, and exposed rafter tails. Fenestration consists of original double-hung windows, multi-pane transoms, bands of casement windows, leaded glass windows, and elaborate stained glass windows. The interior of this house features large fireplaces, built-in mahogany benches and cabinets, mahogany balusters and tapered newel posts with Art Nouveau carvings and contoured caps. The Holmes-Shannon House retains a high degree of integrity.


The house was nominated to the National Register of Historic Places at the local level of significance under Criterion C in the area of Architecture. The house is a product of the dissemination of the Arts and Crafts philosophy and aesthetic in America. It exhibits the distinctive characteristics of its type, period and method of construction. The Holmes-Shannon House is also a good example of the craftsmanship of the locally prominent architectural firm Train and Williams.

# Apartments at 1342-1346 N. Hayworth Avenue



# Apartments at 1342-1346 N. Hayworth Avenue

The property located on N. Hayworth Avenue in West Hollywood is an L-shaped, small multi-family courtyard style apartment complex consisting of two contributing apartment buildings and one contributing one-story, three-car garage. The apartments and the garage were constructed in 1924.

Each building is two-stories and contains a residential unit on each floor. The three residential units are arranged in a broken L-shape around a narrow courtyard area. The front lawn is set back from the sidewalk to the front façade of 1342 N. Hayworth Avenue. A concrete paved sidewalk meanders along the north side of 1342 N. Hayworth Avenue and back towards the other two buildings. On the north side of the walkway is a quatrefoil-shaped fountain that is part of the setting. The three buildings were all designed in a modest Spanish Revival style.

The Apartments at 1342-1346 N. Hayworth Avenue were nominated to the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion C at the local level of significance as a good representative example of the Spanish Colonial Revival style courtyard apartment complex.

The owner of the property has submitted a notarized letter of objection to the listing of 1342-1346 N. Hayworth Avenue in the National Register of Historic Places.
