

- Located on the remnant of a 1839 Mexican land grant and built in 1858 by William Hood, the Hood House is an 8,100 square foot mansion constructed of bricks fired on the site by local Indians.
- A blend of northern and southern Colonial/Greek revival architecture, the mansion was owned by Thomas Kearns from 1905-1918. Kearns, a U. S. Senator from Utah, used Hood House a summer home and entertained Presidents Grant, McKinley and Theodore Roosevelt there.
- In 1959 the Hood House was dedicated as a State Historical Landmark. In 1998, the House was placed on the National Register of Historic Places and the California Register of Historic Places.
