

COME! As the first new state park since 2014, Dos Rios invites visitors to step back in time as they meander through a restored floodplain forest to explore the remarkable connection of water, wildlife, conservation, and ranch life. Located a few minutes west of Modesto and on the confluence of the Tuolumne and San Joaquin rivers, the onetime farmland area has been restored to its natural state. In the lower San Joaquin Valley, Dos Rios is home to various threatened and endangered species, including the valley elderberry longhorn beetle and the riparian brush rabbit. It also supports the life cycles of Central Valley Chinook salmon and steelhead trout, and is the destination for birds of the Pacific Flyway. Currently there are few state parks in the lower San Joaquin Valley; Dos Rios provides nearby communities with a vibrant park, helping to advance equitable access to all and create a healthier California.

GUIDED TOURS

Visit parks.ca.gov/DosRios and click on the "News and Events" tab to see what is happening in the park. Guided hikes on park trails are available and led by a State Parks guide on themes such as birding, endangered species, floodplain forests, water management, climate resiliency, and more. Trails are subject to close due to normal, seasonal flooding.

THINGS TO DO

Enjoy Dos Rios base camp with a walk along the 0.25-mile pathway beside the edge of the pond. Have a picnic and barbecue with friends and family in a ramada overlooking the pond and view amazing birds. Join a guided experience or go for a hike.

PLEASE REMEMBER

Backcountry Trails—There are two trails open for self-guided hikes. Enjoy a 3.8-mile out-and-back-hike on the Confluence Trail or walk the 1.85-mile Pond Loop Trail. Trails are subject to close due to normal, seasonal flooding.

Pets—Dogs are welcome in the base camp area or on the Pond Loop and Confluence Trails, and must be on a maximum 6-foot leash at all times.

Fires—Campfires are not permitted. Visitors may use the provided grills on a first-come, first-served basis.

Collecting—All natural and cultural features are protected by law and should not be disturbed.

Pond—The pond is not available for public use at this time.



YOU CAN HELP SHAPE THE FUTURE OF DOS RIOS

As California's newest state park property, Dos Rios will lead the way in natural resource management and groundwater recharge projects while opening 1,603 acres of land to the public and significantly improve opportunities for recreation and education in the lower San Joaquin Valley.

A General Plan and Environmental Impact Report (EIR) will be created to direct the long-range management, development, and operation of the site by providing broad policy and program guidance. Long-term plans will likely include greater river access for swimming, angling, and boating, along with trails for biking and other outdoor recreation activities.

The development of Dos Rios emphasizes community involvement and input. To make sure that Dos Rios will be created with the communities, the General Plan and EIR process will provide tribal partners, stakeholders, and the public with the opportunity to provide feedback on the property's future. Currently referred to as Dos Rios, the public's input will also play a role in the choice of the park's permanent name.

Dos Rios is a result of the work of River Partners and Tuolumne River Trust. These partners started with flood-prone farmland in 2002 and embarked on the journey of restoring 1,600 acres by planting 350,000 native trees and vegetation along 8 river miles.
