GROVER HOT SPRINGS STATE PARK SUPERINTENDENT ORDER

Food Storage Requirement / Bears: The campgrounds, Park offices, and residence areas within the park have been designated as “bear proof food storage areas” in accordance with California Code of Regulations Title 14 (CCR) section 4323(b). Campground areas require additional food storage compliance, as posted, by use of a State approved bear proof food locker and/or storage device.

Bicycles: CCR 4360 states that “unless designated by the Department, all trails are open to pedestrians and closed to all other uses.” As such, bicycles are only allowed to be operated in a safe and controlled manner on the following areas of this park:

- Established service roads maintained for vehicular travel.
- Paved park roads, parking areas and campground roads
- The Burnside Lake Trail, and the Hot Springs Cutoff Trail.

Park Hours: Other than those areas designated for camping, all facilities, roads, beaches, and trails, etc. are closed from sunset to sunrise daily. Exceptions may include permitted special events, or guided park-led Interpretive activities.

Charcoal and Fire Restrictions: Charcoal fires/grills and wood fires are prohibited at this park with the exception of designated campsites. Only gas camp stoves may be used in any other area of this park, and then only used at developed picnic table locations, in the parking lot, or on the sandy beach. Fire closures may be posted at any time where Department officials have made a finding of extreme fire hazard (CCR 4311). Closures include charcoal grills/barbeques and/or wood campfires periodically as appropriate. Only gas camp stoves will be permitted during full closures. Factors influencing my decision to restrict fires may include, but are not limited to:

- Periods where “red flag” conditions (or other severe weather conditions, to include excessive heat) are forecast
- Periods when the Air Quality Index (AQI) is significantly elevated.
- Periods when fire danger is “Very High” or “Extreme.”
- During periods when fire incidents have caused strain on firefighting and public safety resources.

Prohibited/Closed Areas: In the interest of preserving public health and safety, and protecting the natural and cultural resources within specified portions of park units, the following areas are closed to public use, entry or occupancy:

The Grover Hot Springs Pool Complex when closed to public use.

Rules specific to the Grover Hot Springs Pools: Pursuant to the general authority outlined in CCR 4301, as well as CCR 4319, plus guidelines from the Alpine County Health Department, the following rules are in place in order to ensure the safety of visitors in the pool enclosure, including the two pools, decks, restrooms and changing rooms.

- No diving (head, or upper body entry first) into any pool, or other waters at this park.
- No person shall run near either pool.
- No person shall bring into the pool enclosure food, beverages, alcohol, or containers, except for a plastic or metal container that holds water.
- No glass containers of any kind are allowed.

- No person shall play loud or rough games
- The use of external speakers is prohibited.
- No person shall enter the pools in underwear, street clothes, or in the nude. Swimwear or cutoffs are required.
- Children under 12 years old must be accompanied by an adult. Groups of children under 16 years of age must have at least one adult supervisor per 5 children.
- No smoking of any kind, including cigarettes, cigars, or e-cigarettes ("vaping").

The numbers of persons permitted within the swimming pool enclosure, in the recreation pool and in the hot mineral pool respectively, are limited when deemed safe to not more than:

- Swimming pool enclosure- 75 persons at one time.
- Recreation pool- 25 persons of the 75 above.
- Hot mineral pool- 50 persons of the 75 persons above.

The following regulations pertain to the pool facility at Grover Hot Springs State Park:

- Flotation toys, such as water wings, are not permitted.
- Children ages 6 and under may wear a properly fitting United States Coast Guard approved Type II or Type III life jacket, under the immediate supervision of an adult.

Campground Occupancy: Camping occupancy in the total of Sierra District Parks (specifically including Ed Z'berg Sugar Pine Point SP, DL Bliss SP, Emerald Bay SP, Donner Memorial SP, Tahoe SRA, Grover Hot Springs SP, Plumas Eureka SP, Malakoff Diggins SHP) for Park visitors is limited to 30 nights in total per calendar year per individual visitor, regardless of Park unit. Consecutive-night occupancy is limited to 15 nights in succession and must include a 2-night absence prior to another period of camping occupancy. The purpose of this regulation shall be to maintain fair recreational access for all.

"Hike-and-Bike" Camping: Certain campsites within designated units of the California State Park System have been designated for use by pedestrians and bicyclists travelling recreationally through California. The hike-and-bike camping policy for this park is as follows:

- Maximum consecutive length of stay is two (2) days.
- Following the two-day stay, there must be a 48-hour vacating period from 12 noon of the checkout day to 12 p.m. of the second day following.
- Due to the purpose of the camping being enroute, maximum length of stay in any calendar year is 4 nights.
- Individuals may not be dropped off in the campground by vehicles, in the spirit of maintaining this section as truly for enroute pedestrians and bicyclists.
- Maximum occupancy is determined by unit rangers pursuant to CCR 4323(a) and may include campers occupying a site with occupants from a different traveling party.

This order also shall serve to give rangers the authority and discretion to allow one-night, self-contained camping in day use areas under CCR 4457. Allowances shall be for public safety or resource protection reasons. Standard camping fees shall apply.

Juvenile Curfew: For the protection of juveniles and others and for the safety and welfare of the general public, the following curfew is hereby established for juveniles within the Sierra District, California State Parks.

- Juveniles may not enter or remain in the campground or day use areas of this park between the hours following sunset and proceeding sunrise except as follows:
 - One who is accompanied by a parent or guardian (or had documentation of being an emancipated minor).
 - One who is part of an organized group permitted to occupy a unit or portion thereof and who is supervised by at least one responsible adult for each fifteen juveniles.
 - One who is lawfully camping, having furnished to the department written consent of and the full name, residence number, and telephone number of the juvenile's parent or guardian, with the inclusive dates for which permission is granted to camp at the unit involved.

Model Aircraft and Unmanned Aerial Systems: Model aircraft and Unmanned (unoccupied) Aerial Systems (UAS or “drones”) are an emergent technology that can have a negative impact on Park resources and public safety and are generally inconsistent with the park experience. Due to the dramatic growth and popularity of model aircraft and UAS, and based on concerns related to wildlife, aesthetics, visitor safety and privacy, and fire hazards, the following lands and facilities located within the Sierra District are restricted as follows:

No person shall launch, land, or operate a powered unmanned (unoccupied) aircraft or unmanned (unoccupied) aerial system (UAS) within **any** State Park unit owned or operated as part of the Sierra District of California State Parks.

I the District Superintendent, or my specifically named designee, may grant exemptions to this order as determined to be necessary for the proper administration of the park, and to protect the safety and welfare of its visitors, employees, and resources. Exceptions to this order **may** include:


- Use by trained law enforcement for public safety purposes.
- Use by media outlets
- Non-commercial use upon completion of the park unit’s special event permit application and applicable FAA compliance
- Scientific research with appropriate FAA registration and P unit permits

If any exception is granted, as described above, all UAS/Drone equipment must be made available for inspection of safety compliance at the time of application. All exemptions, except for emergency personnel, must be obtained in writing. Requests for exemptions may be made by contacting the District Superintendent.

I, the District Superintendent, or my specifically named designee, may grant exceptions to this order as determined to be necessary for the proper administration of the park, and to protect the safety and welfare of visitors, employees and resources. All exceptions, except for emergency personnel, must be obtained in writing by the Sierra District Superintendent at P.O. Box 266, Tahoma, CA 96142.

Nothing herein shall be construed in derogation of other provisions of law, existing contracts or property rights previously granted.
